Step 1: Create study outlines of the keywords/concepts and rehearse.

Step 2: Review the assessment standards used to evaluate your essay.

- Thesis: A fully, clearly and accurately stated thesis that answers the assigned question(s) or meets the requirements of the assignment.
- Sources/evidence: Effective and accurate use of appropriate and well-selected evidence and examples drawn from class content and readings.
- Organization/argumentation: Argument is presented in a well-organized and logical way, and supporting evidence and examples are carefully analyzed to effectively argue the thesis.
- Content: Appropriate concepts are thoroughly analyzed and discussed in the essay's body.

Step 3: Review the following questions before taking the exam.

Did my introduction address what the questions asked?
Could my essay have included more terminology and concepts from the course content and required reading?
Do I explain the terminology and concepts used in my essay in detail or did I just cite them?
Does my essay effectively connect the content I am using to address the questions or are the questions answered in a disconnected way?
Was my narration clear and content driven or was it vague and filled with generalizations?
Were my paragraphs uniform or were they composed of varying topics leading to a lack of cohesiveness?
Did my essay have factual errors?
Did I have an excessive number of surface errors?
